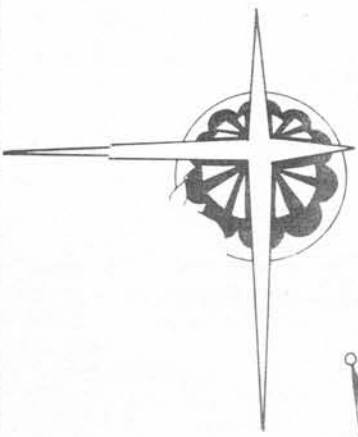


On Peddling

Peddling by the deaf is on the increase. Several individuals have been seen in the Salt Lake City area.

The UAD has a policy which does not approve of this activity because it hurts the status of the deaf in the community. People who encounter these deaf peddlers are asked to cooperate in discouraging this activity.

Salt Lake City has an ordinance which prohibits peddling in the downtown area; also another ordinance which requires the purchasing of a \$25.00 license per day to peddle in the city.



New Chapel In Future For Salt Lake Valley Ward

The picture above is to give the reader a good graphic imagination of what the new Salt Lake Valley Ward for the Deaf will look like when completed. This new ward building will be the first church solely designed to meet the needs of the deaf in which the deaf, themselves, played a major part.

Tentative plans are for a full size building: a full size gym, a chapel to seat 300, a Junior Sunday School, a Relief Society Room, and approximately fifteen classrooms with provisions for eight more by means of folding walls. The Salt Lake Park Stake Presidency and the High Council will be housed in the building which will be almost adjacent to the present Park Stake Center. The First Ward will also share the new ward on a rotated time basis.

There is an urgent need to raise \$98,000 in funds to start the ward. Total cost of the new ward is estimated at \$700,000. Architectural plans are being completed and the ground on which the new ward will be built is being cleared.

The old S.L.V.W. for the Deaf, situated two blocks north is now being offered for sale and 30 percent of the selling price will be applied to the new ward. All members and friends are being asked to give of their time and means to help achieve this goal. Donated labor is also being encouraged to members and friends. The First Presidency and the Quorum of the Twelve, the governing head of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) have pledged to see the new ward project completed.

EDITORIAL

INTEGRATION:

Is The Cost In Human Lives Worth It?

The catch-words are "normalcy," "mainstreaming," "maximum cultural involvement" and others that ring of pie in the sky for deaf children who are integrated in the normal public schools. The fact as we are beginning to see them, to our utter dismay, appear more like "social promotion," "unfair competition," "limited opportunities," frustration for parents at lack of progress, and social disaster for the children.

Even allowing for individual differences, which seem to be magnified by deafness, the children just do not seem to be making it in the public schools. We can see problems developing as one child after another gives up or is turned off — and it is no fault of the sincere and dedicated teachers, whether oral or total communication in philosophy. We question whether the system of "integration" is working; and we sincerely believe that a calm, objective, and professional appraisal should be made of the entire system to see if it is producing as its proponents claim it is.

Apart from whether it is successful or not as an experiment in education of deaf children, integration gives us another even more serious concern: The public schools are not all that good. They have their own problems, as any honest principal or administrator will admit. Teachers vary widely in their abilities to teach, in their personalities, in their rapport with the pupils; students themselves, even with normal hearing, pose all kinds of educational problems. Administrators and principals have their hangups, and the quality of leadership in a school can and does affect the entire atmosphere. So putting deaf children into situations such as these, under the guise of normalizing their education, may actually work to their disadvantage: educationally, socially, emotionally and psychologically.

It begins to appear that a centralized day school for the deaf in the Salt Lake area, under one administrator or principal, would be more efficient from the standpoint of grading, travel time, administration, social interaction, peer group learning, programming specifically for deafness, and athletic and vocational or career development. In this time of consolidation of school districts for more efficient operations, we are suggesting that the State Board of Education might also examine the possibilities in consolidating scattered day classes for the deaf.

GREETINGS

FROTHY PINK EGГNOG

- 6 eggs, separated
- ½ cup sugar
- 1 can (26 ounces) berry Hawaiian punch, chilled
- ½ gallon vanilla ice cream, softened
- Nutmeg

In a medium bowl, beat egg yolks until fluffy. Gradually add ¼ cup of the sugar and continue beating until thick and lemon colored. Pour Yolk mixture into a large cold bowl. Gradually add the punch to egg mixture, mixing with a wire whip or egg beater. Add vanilla ice cream, a few scoops at a time, mixing until smooth. Chill at least one hour.

Just before serving, beat egg whites until foamy. Add the remaining ¼ cup sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, and beat until stiff peaks form.

Gradually fold a small amount of the punch mixture into meringue, then fold meringue back into remaining punch. Pour into punch bowl and place bowl in a larger bowl of crushed ice if possible. Ladle eggnog into punch cups or stemmed glasses and sprinkle with nutmeg. Makes about 4½ quarts.

TANGY BISCUITS

- 2 cups sifted flour
 - 1 T baking powder
 - 1 t salt
 - ¼ cup shortening
 - ¾ cup milk
 - 1 t horseradish (powdered)
 - 2 t dried parsley
- Mix flour, baking powder and salt together. Cut in shortening and horseradish and parsley. Add milk and pat out on pastry cloth to ½" thickness. Cut into 1½ inch square biscuits. Place on preheated, greased electric griddle. Cover and bake for 6 minutes at 350 degrees. Turn biscuits and bake for 3 to 4 minutes longer. Keep covered until serving time. Bake with lid vent open. Yield: 2½ dozen biscuits.

MULLED CRANBERRY DRINK

- 3 bottles (16 oz) cranberry juice
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 cups water
- ½ cup lemon juice
- ½ cup orange juice
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon
- 12 whole cloves
- butter

Combine cranberry juice, sugar and water. Stir to dissolve sugar. Heat to boiling point. Place spices in cloth bag tied tightly at top. Add to juice. Simmer 30 minutes. Remove spice bag.

Just before serving add orange juice and lemon juice. Heat to boiling. Dot with butter. Serves 18.

LIGHT CHRISTMAS FRUIT CAKE

- ¾ cup butter
- 1½ cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 3½ cups sifted all-purpose flour
- ½ tsp soda
- 1½ tsp salt
- 1½ teaspoons nutmeg
- 1 cup cultured sour cream
- 1 cup cut dates
- 1 cup raisins
- 1 pound mixed candied fruit
- 2 cups chopped pecans

Line greased pans with waxed paper; allow paper to extend ½ inch above all sides of pan; grease paper. Cream butter; add sugar gradually. Add eggs one at a time; beat until light and fluffy. Blend in sifted dry ingredients and sour cream alternately. Mix in fruits and pecans. Fill pans ¾ full. Baking time depends on size, shape and material of pans. Bake at 275 degrees about 60 minutes per pound for 2 to 4 pound cakes. Bake about 45 minutes per pound for 4 to 6 pound cakes. Remove paper while warm.

CHOW MEIN DATE BARS

- ½ cup soft butter
 - ¼ cup brown sugar, packed
 - 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
 - 3 eggs, slightly beaten
 - 1½ cups brown sugar, packed
 - 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
 - ¼ teaspoon salt
 - 1 teaspoon baking powder
 - 1 cup chopped pecans
 - 1 cup cut dates
 - 1 cup chow mein noodles
- Mix butter, ¼ cup brown sugar and 1 cup flour together; press into greased 13x9x2 inch pan. Bake at 375 degrees 10 minutes. Beat eggs slightly; blend in remaining ingredients. Spread over warm crust. Reduce temperature to 350 degrees. Bake about 20 minutes longer. Cut into small bars while warm. Makes about 5½ dozen.

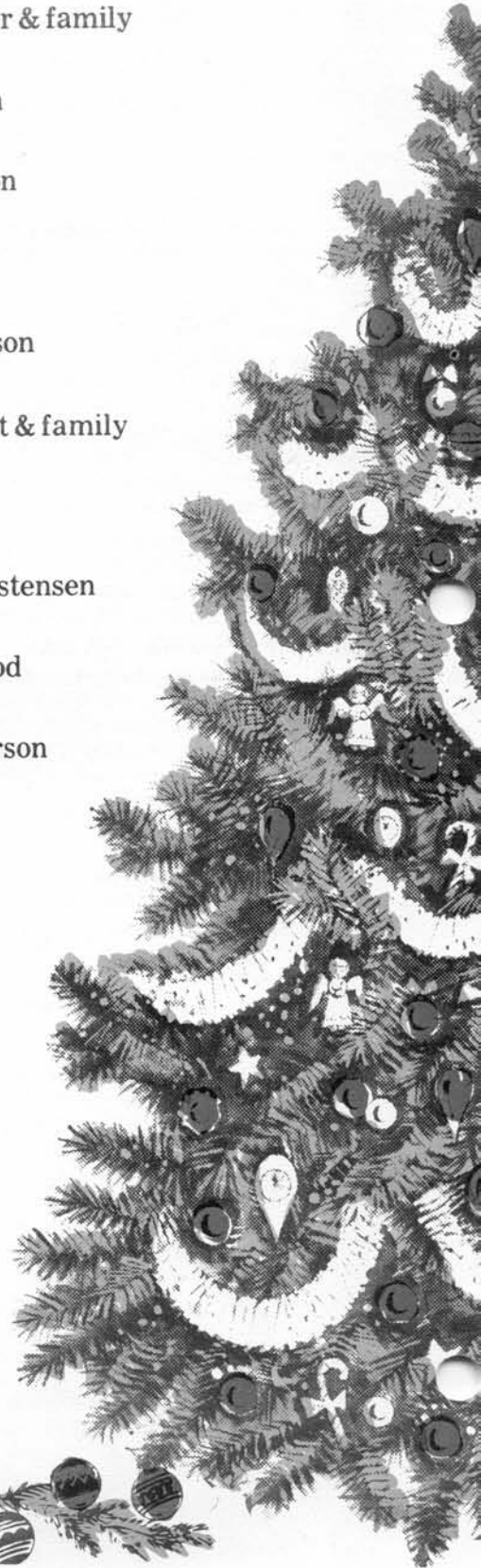

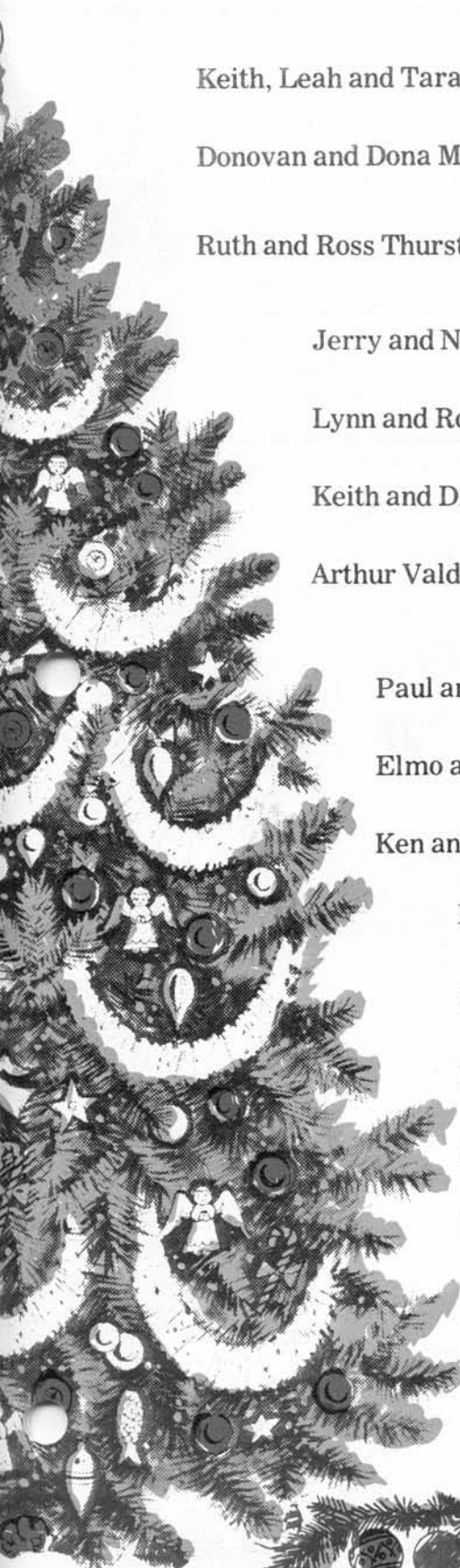

TV Captioning On National News

A recently developed technique of television captioning allows deaf people and those with hearing impairments to watch a captioned version of the ABC Evening News in color only 5 hours after its original broadcast. This is the first time that this audience, which numbers about 15 million nationally, has had easy access to a network national news program.

Beginning December 3, 1973 and continuing for a year, the captioned news program is produced Monday through Friday in Boston and shown at 11 p.m. by public television stations along the Eastern seaboard.

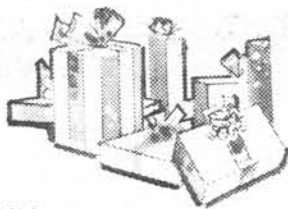
Wanderlust . . .

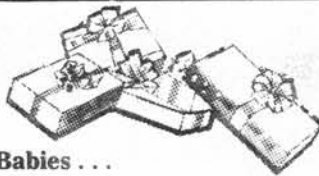
Hospital Rounds . . .
