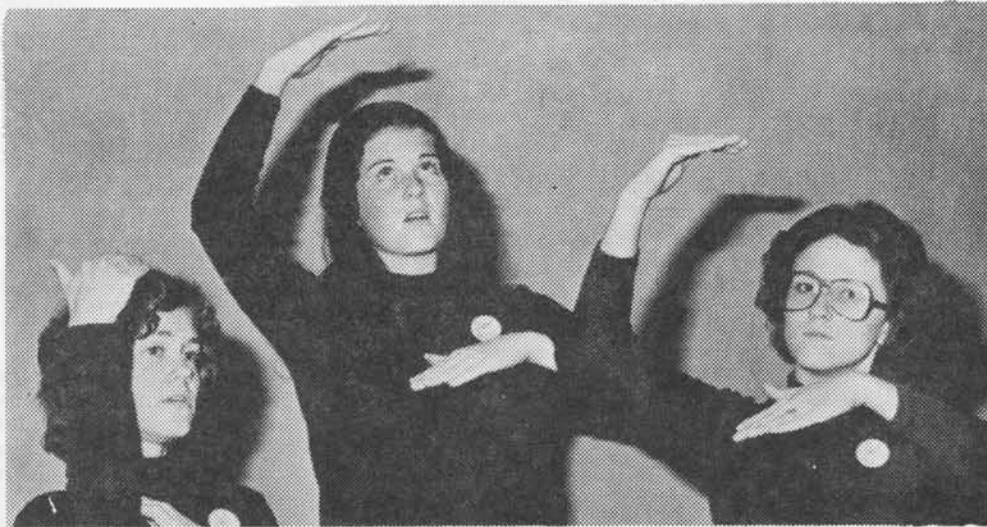

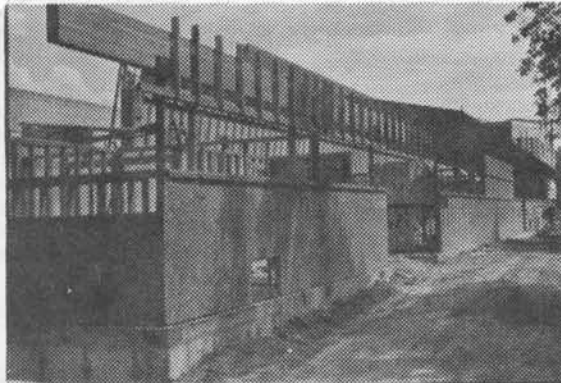

Governor's Advisory Council Meetings

Concerned deaf citizens may like to attend meetings of the Governor's Advisory Council on Schools for the Deaf to get an idea of what matters are before the council.

This group usually meets monthly on the second Tuesday of the month at the Utah Board of Education Building at 6:30 p.m.

Notices of monthly meetings are sent to organizational heads. Since a meeting date or place can be changed, it would be best to contact your president for exact information.

Participation in most meetings are limited to members only with visitors listening. Twice a year, however, the board will declare an open meeting, during which individuals may present matters.

Those who are interested in participating in an open meeting are advised to contact the chairman, Ned Wheeler, or the secretary, Dr. J. J. Campbell, at least ten days before so that the agenda can include the individual's presentation.

Non-Published Phone Numbers For Deaf TTY Users

The telephone company has agreed to make non-published and non-listed telephone numbers available to deaf TTY users without cost. The company has sent out letters explaining this, but since there is some confusion in understanding the letter, we'll attempt to make it clear.

Non-published: Your name and telephone number will not be published in the telephone book, but people who ask the phone company for your number can get it.

Non-listed: Your name and telephone number will not be published and people cannot get it by asking the telephone company for it — it will be secret, and only you can give it out to your friends.

There will be no charge to deaf users of the TTY for this service. However, you must let the telephone company know what you want it to do. If you have received a letter from the company, send back the form. Let them know that you have a TTY. If you do not have a TTY and want a non-published or non-listed number they will make a charge for it.

Voter's Registration

Did you vote on November 2? No matter how the results came out, the most important thing is that you took the time to register and to vote in this year's elections.

Many Weber County residents were signed up by Dennis Platt, who had been authorized by that county as a roving agent.

In order to register deaf people living in other counties, a mail campaign was set up with the blessing of the UAD board.

Each household received one or more registration form and envelope.

A few of you may not have registered yet. You still can register for next year's elections. Simply go to your country clerk's office and ask for a registration form.

Why vote? A good question. We do have the right to be heard on matters that affect us — services to the deaf, TV captioning, vocational rehabilitation, schools for the deaf. Matters like these are decided by our elected officials. We want to vote for the right person who understands the needs of the deaf.

A perfect example is our planned community center for the deaf. Unless we get out and vote, meet our new legislators, lobby for this center by talking about it and writing about it, we won't get anywhere. Elected officials will listen to people who take the time to be registered and to vote.

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911 Emergency Line

People with TTY's in Salt Lake County have access to the 911 emergency line, thanks to the recent installation of a TTY in the office.

The 911 emergency line is in operation 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The staff works in the underground Emergency Operations Center below the Salt Lake City Police Station.

Workers taking calls determine the nature of the emergency and the address of the caller, then plug the calls into the proper agency: police, fire, highway patrol, paramedics or poison control center.

Dial 911 when you need emergency services.

Unveiling Ceremony at Ogden Branch

With more than one hundred and fifty friends, relatives and members on hand, the oil portrait of President Max W. Woodbury was unveiled recently at the Ogden Branch for the Deaf. Mrs. Miriam Cooper, daughter of the late Pres. Woodbury, did the honors.

Bishop Lynn Losee of Valley Ward and President Roy Cochran of Ogden Branch were speakers on the program. A brief movie of Mr. Woodbury and a tape recording of his life, in his own voice, were part of the program. Beth Jensen gave a lovely rendition of "President Woodbury" a song translated in signs.

President Max W. Woodbury was instrumental in establishing the Ogden Branch, the first LDS church for the deaf, in 1916. He served as its president for 51 years. Upon his death in 1970, contributions were made in his memory, thus forming the nucleus of a fund which eventually materialized into an oil portrait.

Well-known local artist, Farrell Collett, did this portrait in four months' time.

Our second counselor, Bro. Roy E. Smith, died at his home of an heart attack on September 14. Funeral service was held at Clearfield 7th Ward (which he had helped to build) with President Roy Cochran officiating. Sympathy goes to his widow, Sis. Ruth Smith, and the family.

One more activity before Christmas, will be a pizza dinner on December 17, at 6:00 p.m. "Tora, Tora, Tora", the true story of Pearl Harbor which happened 35 years ago, will be shown.

HOW TO USE AN INTERPRETER

The interpreter is frequently confronted by a very sticky situation: Divorce cases where the deaf persons are both friends of the interpreter, and both at different times ask the interpreter to "work for me". Normally an interpreter in such a situation should withdraw on ethical considerations; but when the persons involved do not want another available interpreter, or others are simply not available, then the problem for the interpreter becomes one of "for whom do I work?"

The most logical solution is that the interpreter should work for the court, and not for either deaf person. Few deaf people realize that the interpreter does not want to "take sides"; professional interpreters who have high ethics and subscribe to the Code want to serve all deaf people equally, and be on friendly terms.

Deaf people therefore should try not to put an interpreter in a bad position of taking sides by asking him or her to "work for me"; rather, where there is a conflict between two deaf persons that

must be settled by the courts, the lawyers representing them should ask the court to appoint an interpreter. It is up to the deaf person to make sure that the lawyers know that an interpreter is needed.

Only NRID or URID certified interpreters should be used in court cases. Certification by the National Registry or by the Utah Registry is the only guarantee that the interpreter is qualified for such a serious responsibility. The court, or either lawyer, may challenge the competence and qualifications of an interpreter, so certification is vital to protect both the interpreter and the deaf persons involved.

Whether certified or not, all persons who try to interpret for deaf people should understand, accept, and observe the Code of Ethics. Board Minutes

February 1, 1976

Executive Meeting

The officers voted to recommend the UAD Board a \$25.00 full page advertisement to be placed in the program book of the USD Reunion, June 24-26.

They also voted \$30.00 to purchase trophies for the NWAAD basketball tournament, March 5-6. First choice was the All-Stars trophies; second, the second place trophy.

In other matters, the executive board voted to transfer \$1,500.00 from the UAD general fund to the TTY Project fund as a temporary measure to meet payroll obligations. This was necessary as the second installment of the project funds to be paid to the UAD by the Division of Rehabilitation had not yet come through.

Discussion towards the end of this meeting revolved around the center for the deaf and the necessity of organizing several action committees.

February 21, 1976

General Meeting

There were several announcements made before the actual session began. The president announced the availability of TTY directories from Robert Bonnell; the change in date for Amateur Night, from April 24 to April 23; and that winning skits from Amateur Night would be invited to present their play at the PRWAD conference in July.

Reading of the 1975 convention minutes was suspended.

UAD will have TTY ribbons and paper rolls available through Norman Williams and Bob Lunnen. Val Platt will have the same supplies for the Ogden area.

The next UAD Bulletin will have names of committee chairmen. Also, the executive board has voted to donate a trophy to the NWAAD tournament. Announcement was made that the Governor's Advisory Council of the Utah Schools for the Deaf and the Blind would meet on March 9 and that deaf people were encouraged to attend.

The vice-president reported the bylaws committee was studying and making recommendations in changing the bylaws, and would have these recommendations in final form later.

The treasurer reported on the financial status of the Association. As of March 7, assets totaled \$4,620.88.

There were 37 active members eligible to vote. There were many other visitors and students in the auditorium.

A report was given on the center for the deaf. The governor was reported as having signed a bill to permit the State Building Board to make a study of the center for the deaf.

The UAD TTY project was reported on. There is a possibility of purchasing more TTY machines for resale; the matter was referred to the executive board.

An urgent appeal was made to those having two TTY machines, to return the extra ones to the Services to the Deaf for reissuance, and if bought, to sell them as there is now a severe shortage of TTY machines.

Three important resolutions were proposed, seconded and passed by the general membership.

The first resolution thanked Dr. Harvey C. Hirschi and Dr. Vaughn L. Hall for their solid support in developing the TTY service system and the Telecommunications Training Project, and Robert C. Lunnen for his many hours of donated service.

The second gave thanks to Dr. Walter D. Talbot for seeing the feasibility study on a comprehensive community center for the deaf through to the Legislature. The last praised Governor Calvin L. Ramp-ton for keeping his vow, made at the UAD convention, to sponsor a center for the deaf. The governor mentioned in his budget message monies to be set aside for a feasibility study

by the State Building Board for a center for the deaf.

The secretary was instructed to communicate these resolutions to the appropriate people.

The president explained the board had budgeted \$375.00 for delegate's expenses to the NAD convention in Houston, Tx.

The \$375.00 delegate's expenses was approved by the membership.

Nominations for the delegate's job was then opened; Fay Young, Peter Green and David Mortensen were nominated. On secret ballot, Peter Green was elected; subsequently, David Mortensen was elected alternate.

The forthcoming NWAAD basketball tournament was announced; Kenneth and Priscilla Burdett were thanked for making the movie available to us for the evening.

March 7, 1976

Directors' Meeting

At this meeting, the directors ratified action made at the executive board meeting on February 1.

It was moved, seconded and passed that all emergency financial action, in the event a board meeting is not feasible, be carried out by telephone (TTY) or letter. With no majority objection, action may be taken and ratified at the next board meeting.

The officers were given authority by the board to determine the most feasible cost-benefit method of securing TTY machines from a Chicago supplier, up to \$3,000.00 plus what it might get on a sales contract. The board set a price of cost plus 60% on these machines, with 10% discount to UAD members of one or more years' standing.

Power was delegated to the officers to investigate a plan to provide Phonotypes for needy deaf people and to encourage other social and civic organizations to do the same.

A fund of \$150.00 was set up to be used exclusively for the purchase and sale of TTY supplies to consumers.

Plans for a watchdog committee to organize support for the center for the deaf are to be developed by the officers, and presented to the board.

It was generally agreed that after various organizations had been contacted with regard to the plan, a bill would be submitted to the legislative analyst's office by August. By September, all deaf voters are to be registered, and by late fall watchdog teams would be trained and ready to go to work.

May 23, 1976

Directors' Meeting

It was decided to sell the old UAD addressograph machine and frames for plates.

After general discussion on the TTY project budget, it was moved that the secretary be directed to request appropriate changes in the TTY project budget from the Division of Rehabilitation.

A motion was made to correct the convention minutes to straighten the record on names of trustees.

General consent was given to a 50-50 proposition for Amateur Night profits. After expenses were deducted, 50% would be allotted for prizes, with the monies split 50%-35%-15% to the nearest dollar.

Dennis Platt was accepted as a voter registration assistant for Weber County.

In a resolution, the board instructed the chairman of the old UAD Scholarship Fund to transfer funds to the new Utah Scholarship Foundation for the Deaf.

After deciding on Salt Lake City as the site of the 1977 UAD convention, Rollin Jones was nominated and accepted as chairman for this convention.

A vote of sincere appreciation was given to Albert Scioniers for his great job in selling UAD candies in the fund-raising campaign.

June 1, 1976

Executive Meeting

Approval was given by the officers to purchase testing equipment for the TTY project and to transfer some funds between categories.

A new UAD letterhead has been made and will be printed in quantity soon.

Further discussion on the watchdog committee resulted in the agreement to follow the plan outlined at the previous UAD board meeting. All organizations for and of the deaf will be contacted and their leaders invited to a meeting.

An up to date report on the TTY project will be put before the officers at the next executive meeting.

September 12, 1976

Executive Meeting

Meeting of the executive board on September 12, 1976 held at the Fay Young home.

A Budget report for 1975-1976 was accepted and referred to the board of directors.

The 1976-1977 budget was agreed upon, subject to approval by the board of directors. A copy of the budget will be sent to each director when a notice of meeting for September 26 is mailed.

It was agreed to apply for sales tax exemption from the State of Utah. David Mortensen will handle this matter.

Voter's registration of deaf people by mail was tentatively agreed upon by the officers, to be approved by the board of directors. Dennis Platt will mail appropriate materials.

A meeting of the board of directors was agreed for September 26, 2:30 p.m. at the Utah Board of Education Building in Salt Lake City.

September 26, 1976

Board Meeting

Meeting of the board of directors on September 26, held at the Utah Board of Education building in Salt Lake City.

The 1976-1977 budget was submitted and accepted after an item by item discussion. One item was clarified: the revolving fund for purchase of supplies for sale to deaf members and patrons could receive proceeds from sales, maintaining more or less the sum of \$150.00, without need to get authorization from the board.

The treasurer's report for July 1 to September 26 was accepted after a minor correction and clarification.

David Mortensen gave a verbal report on the State Fair booth project. After considerable discussion of the merits, demerits and experience of those involved, the report was accepted.

Letters of appreciation are to be sent by David Mortensen to booth workers and by the secretary, Robert Sanderson, to the BYU Singers. Albert Scioniers, who managed the candy sales; Arthur Valdez, Robert Lunnen and Norman Williams were praised for their contributions of time.

Peter Green gave a verbal report on the NAD convention in Houston, Tx. He also reported he had won a position as NAD board member from Region IV on the 4th ballot. The report was accepted.

It was accepted by the board that Dennis Platt be given board support and money for mailing of registration and voting materials. The sum of \$75.00 was to be taken from unappropriated funds for this purpose.

Amateur Night grossed \$296.63; after expenditures, the net profit came to \$88.63. The Amateur Night for 1976 was handled by Gene Stewart.

Lagoon Outing grossed \$98.55; after expenditures, the net profit came to \$35.60, despite management (Lagoon) foulups and a heavy rainstorm at the park. Ned Wheeler was chairman of this event.

The TTY project, with the possibility of further funds, was discussed. David Mortensen as president was authorized to request funds and sign any necessary agreement or contract with Rehabilitation.

Travel monies for TTY trainee Norman Williams to obtain training in California at Applied Communica-

tions and Micon Industries in November was given approval as there is money available in the budget.

David Mortensen subsequently approved \$348.00 for airfare to San Francisco and six days' allowance for this purpose.
