Roars From the Weber State Wildcat

In anticipation of school beginning on September 27, an all day tutor/notetaker workshop sponsored by Services for Disabled Students was held on Monday, September 17. The workshop was conducted by Dr. Russell Osguthorpe of the Brigham Young University-David O. McKay Institute of Instructional Development. Dr. Osguthorpe was on the faculty at the National Technical Institute for the Deaf and developed the tutor/notetaker program used at NTID and at other institutions across the nation. A total of 15 participants were trained in taking notes and tutoring hearing impaired students. Dr. Osguthorpe will return for follow up instructions and evaluate the notes that participants take for deaf students during the fall quarter.

During the 1979 fall quarter, Services for Disabled Students will serve 16 hearing impaired individuals seeking post secondary education. These students are majoring in various areas including drafting, interior design, secretarial science, accounting and other fields. Services for Disabled Students provides academic support services for all students with physical disabilities. For the hearing impaired the services provided are: interpreting, note-taking, tutoring, academic counseling, career planning and placement and assistance in other areas as well.

Every two weeks, captioned films are shown at WSC; the schedule is shown on the first page of this newsletter. The deaf community is welcome to attend these showings at no charge.
