UAD Starts a Special Adult Education Program

The Utah Association for the Deaf has received a small grant from the Adult Education Unit of the State Board of Education for the purpose of beginning an experimental pilot program.

The courses offered will be those for which we have heard specific requests: Consumer Economics, Current Events, Family Relationships and Human Sexuality. Instructors will be Dennis Platt, Jim Hilber, Edith Javens and Tom Erickson, respectively. Edith and Tom are both certified social workers with many years of experience in their fields.

Classes will be offered in both Ogden and Salt Lake areas. See flyer announcing dates, times and places. Normally the classes will be one and a half hour per night. Each class will be for four nights each in Ogden and Salt Lake City. There is no registration fee.

Deaf people are urged to take advantage of these special classes. This is a very special project and if it is successful, more such courses may be offered in the future.

Subscription Rates Go Up January 1, 1981

In response to a need to balance the books on the UAD Bulletin and to pay a stipend to Val Platt, the editor, the subscription rate will go up to \$4.50 a year, effective January 1, 1981.

Here's your chance to renew your subscription at the present rate of \$3.50 a year. You may renew up to the end of 1983. To answer your question, "when does my subscription expire?" the Bulletin staff will mark the November mailing labels with the expiration date. The November issue goes out at the end of October.

Health Care Program for Children

There is an Early Periodic Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment (EPSDT) Program, a preventive health care program for children from birth to 21 years of age who are eligible for Medicaid.

Regular health examinations are important for children because health problems which are found and treated early are easier to correct, save medical costs, prevent problems from becoming more serious and help children become healthy, productive adults.

The health checkups may be provided through a doctor's office medical clinic or health center or the local health department. Participants in the program may also receive dental services, eye examinations and other services, if needed. Services are provided at no charge as long as the individual is on Medicaid.

Further information on this program may be obtained from the local health department in your area or through offices of Assistance Payments or Family Services.

Obscene (Dirty) TTY Calls

Some deaf people are receiving obscene (dirty) TTY calls. Such calls are against the law, and should be reported immediately to the telephone company.

If you get a dirty TTY call and the person does not give his or her name, you should write down on your TTY paper the time and date you received the call. Then, the same night between 8 and 9 pm, call Mountain Bell, 237-8640 (outside of Salt Lake area, dial 1 first) and tell them about it. Mountain Bell will need to have two forms signed, and then will hunt down the person who made the dirty call and may prosecute.

Save all the papers from such dirty calls and give them to the Mountain Bell representative.

Update on Closed Captioning

The roster of shows to be televised by NBC this fall includes "Little House on the Prairie," "Disney's Wonderful World," "Diff'rent Strokes," and "The Sunday Big Event."

ABC will broadcast "The Friday Night Movie," "Three's Company," "Barney Miller," "Eight is Enough," and "Love Boat."

PBS has scheduled "Cosmos," "Masterpiece Theatre," "Once Upon a Classic," "From Jumpstreet," "Great Performances," "The Body in Question," "Here's to Your Health," "Connections," "Nova," "Over Easy," "Soundstage," "Up and Coming," and "3-2-1 Contact."

Syndicated shows which have adopted captioning include "Jack Van Impe Presents..." and "Robert Schuller with the Hour of Power." In addition, beginning in September, NCI will caption the 24 hour "Monte Carlo" series.

There are 19 advertisers who use the captioning service. In addition, one advertising agency in Los Angeles has adopted a policy of urging all its clients to have commercials captioned.

NCI recently signed a three-year contract with the U.S. Department of Education to close caption 600 hours of programming. All the programs will be made available to schools around the country and many will be broadcast by PBS. Those programs airing this fall include: "Infinity Factory," "Pearls," "Bean Sprouts," "People of the First Light," "Vegetable Soup 2," "As We See It" and "Que Pasa, USA?" "Que Pasa" is captioned in both English and Spanish.

Vibes from Utah School for the Deaf, continued

++ The Utah Board of Education accepted during its August meeting the newly revised transportation policy for further study. The policy covers deaf students enrolled at the Utah School for the Deaf. No figures were given as much depends on the evaluations next month of student transportation needs. The key points in this policy are:

1. Day students in Ogden and Salt Lake City -- transportation is provided by ServiCar (Ogden) or Yellow Cab (SLC) unless parents accept UTA.

2. Day students in Logan, Provo and St. George -- school districts are responsible for school aged students. For pre-schoolers, reimbursement will be made for parents who provide transportation.

3a. Residential students who live within 90 miles of the Ogden camps -- will go home every weekend. Collection points north and south of the school have been arranged.

3b. Residential students who live outside of the 90 mile limit are allowed 4 round trips home: Thanksgiving, Christmas, spring vacation and summer. They can also travel on other weekends within 90 miles.

4. Ogden students who live within 15 miles of the Ogden campus cannot live in the dormitory unless the student's evaluation requires it.

5. Foster home placement are to be made within easy access of transportation collection points.
