Mark Welsh, who had been on the staff for a year, has left to return to college, and will be attending Brigham Young University in Provo. Taking his place for the month of August, Lucy Greenwood also assumed duties of Beth Ann Campbell, interpreter specialist, while Beth Ann was on vacation for four weeks.

Starting September 1, the interpreter based at the Center for the Deaf will be Kirk Walker. A son of deaf parents in Montana, Kirk graduated from the Utah State University in Logan recently. Wilma Powell remains as senior interpreter for the Salt Lake area, and is based at the Salt Lake County Mental Health Services in Midvale.

In the Ogden area, Steve Richards will continue to serve on interpreting assignments. Lucy Greenwood will be one of two interpreters available on call in Ogden.

## Update on Center for the Deaf

Except for some hardware which the contractor is awaiting, the Center for the Deaf remodeling has been completed and turned over to the state. This is the time for all organizations to finish up their offices -- touch up paint, vacuum carpeting, arrange furnishings, install drapes or venetian blinds. The Center also needs volunteers to come in and do odd jobs in and around the Center, primarily painting of the conference rooms.

The Advisory Council of the Utah Community Center for the Deaf will meet on September 11, at 4:00 pm, to decide on a date for the dedication. The Council members want to see the Center 'spic and span' -- ready for the visitors who will see the Center during the dedication. Go back and read the first paragraph of this article...

It will be another year or two before further major remodeling can be done. This will require a large monetary appropriation from the Utah legislature. In the plans are an elevator and a retaining wall along the east side of the property to prevent future mudslides and flooding. For now, the Center is fully operational, with remodeling done by the contractor to meet fire safety standards and by volunteers who have pitched in to upgrade the Center and its grounds.

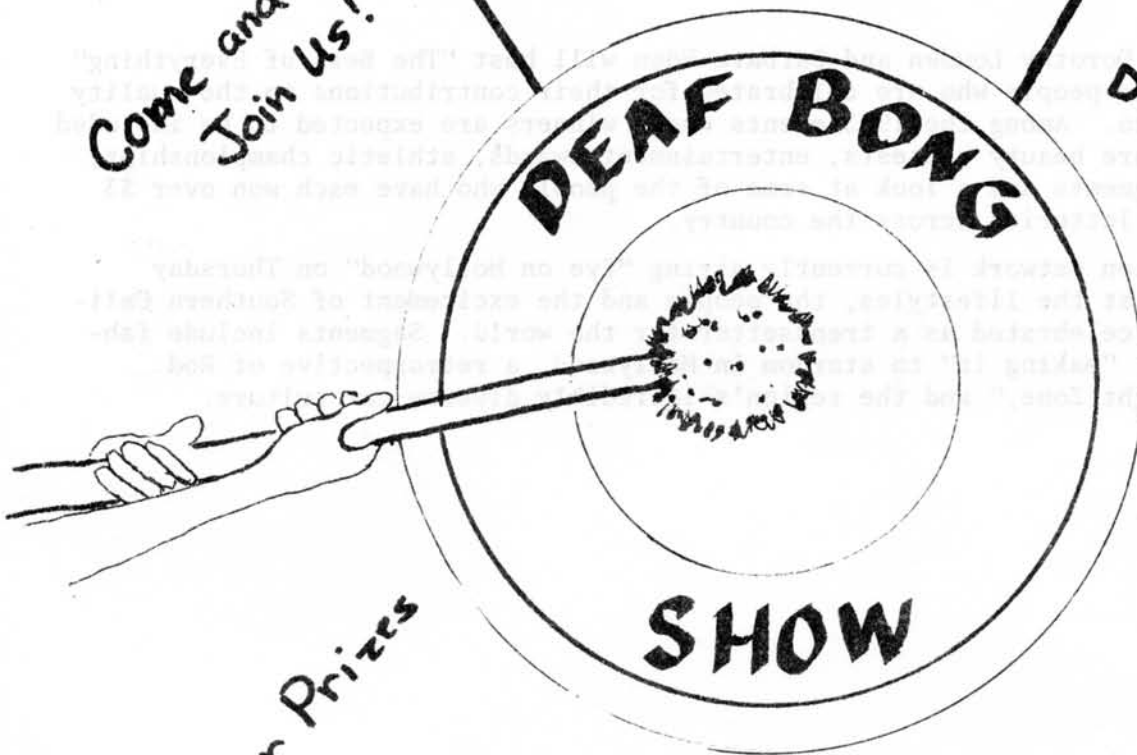
