Rape Prevention Classes to be Held in Ogden

Beginning on Thursday, February 9 at 7:00 pm, rape prevention classes will be held at St. Benedict's Hospital in its education rooms in the basement. Women from the age of 17 are invited to learn about rape and prevention.

Dr. Peter Spennato, a dentist who is studying psychology for a second doctorate, and who is an expert on martial arts, will give this class in three parts: first, a discussion of men's attitude towards women that lead to abuse and rape; second, a discussion of women's perception of themselves that results in denial of responsibility; and third, demonstration of self defense techniques.

The classes will be held on Thursdays for four to six weeks; wear warm-ups or sweat clothes (no jeans or shoes). An interpreter will be on hand. Contact Barbara Bass at 825-5481 after 4:00 pm weekdays in Roy.

Mountain Bell offers a 50% discount on long distance calls to callers who communicate by means of TTY or TDD. If you have not yet applied for this discount, call Valerie Platt at 533-4605 and she will mail you a copy of the application form. Before this form can be sent off to Mountain Bell, it needs to be signed by someone who can certify that you are hearing impaired and use a TTY/TDD, such as a Services to the Deaf counselor in either Rehab or mental health.

Update on Closed Captioning

\*\*\* "How About...", the award winning, syndicated television series of science reports by Mr. Wizard Studios started its fifth season with closed captions for hearing impaired viewers. The 52 reports in each year's series have been underwritten by the National Science Foundation and the General Motors Research Laboratories. The 80 second adult reports highlight scientific, technological and medical reserach advances and are generally aired in newscasts.

\*\*\* Six major home video entertainment suppliers -- CBS/Fox Video, MGM/UA Home Video, Paramount Home Video, RCA/Columbia Home Video, MCA Home Video and Vestron Video -- now close caption their programs. Over 40 different closed captioned home video programs are currently available to home entertainment centers nationwide. Recent NCI studies indicate that more than 20 percent of all closed caption decoder owners also have a VCR or videodisc player.

\*\*\* VideoConcepts, a national chain of 185 home video entertainment stores located in major regional shopping malls, has reached an agreement with National Captioning Institute to market TeleCaption adapters (decoders) needed to trigger hidden subtitles, making them visible so that hearing impaired viewers can read on the television screen what they cannot hear. In addition, the retail chain will display closed captioned videocassettes and videodiscs in a specially designated in-store location, making it easy for hearing impaired consumers to select home video programs that have been closed captioned.

Update on Closed Captioning, continued

\*\*\* The Council of the Annenberg/CPB Project has contracted with the National Captioning Institute to close caption eight upcoming series of educational telecourses to be aired by the Public Broadcasting Service, beginning January 14. In all, 97 hours of programming will be closed captioned under this agreement which extends through 1986. The first in the series to be aired is "The New Literacy: An Introduction to Computers" which began January 14. The telecourse consists of 26 half hour programs offering a comprehensive view of data processing and computers. The series will be aired each week through April 7. Other Annenberg/CPB project telecourses will be announced from time to time.

\*\*\* SHOWTIME's February offering is "Flashdance," one of 1983's biggest box office successes. It is the story of a spirited young woman who is a factory worker by day and a nightclub dancer by night. The movie follows her life as she struggles to pursue a career as a prima ballerina. The movie is closed captioned.

Also on SHOWTIME, "Shelley Duvall's Faerie Tale Theatre" will be shown with closed captions.

\*\*\* Local Utahns who watch Channel 4 and are frustrated with poor captioning should note down the date, time and program on which closed captions are garbled, missing or otherwise not clear. National Captioning Institute wants feedback on this problem. Give all information to Valerie Platt; she will see to that it is passed on to NCI.

\*\*\* Beginning in 1984, Home Box Office (HBO) will close caption one cable show per month.

\*\*\* Vestron Video will release "Mr. Mom" and "Easy Money" with closed captions on videocassettes and videodiscs through home video stores in February.
