President's Message -- Dave Mortensen

Peter Green, chairman of the Utah Association of the Deaf board of directors, resigned from the board as member, effective August 19. He had been a board member since 1975 and the chairman of the board since 1977. A vote of thanks for his service was made and passed by the board with regrets to see him leave. Our new board member is Stanley O'Neal. He ranked 12th when voting took place at the UAD convention last fall, so he was asked to fill in the vacancy. Nominations for the position of chairman of the board were made, with Roy Cochran and Lloyd Perkins being nominated; election will take place at the next UAD board meeting, September 16th.

Notes on the Baltimore convention: The NAD referendum to raise the NAD quota fee from two to four dollars per year was ratified, with 38 states voting yes and 8 voting no. Five states did not vote. This referendum becomes effective January 1, 1985.

Deaf and hard of hearing people who sightsee in Washington, DC will be interested in knowing that sign language and oral interpreters are available at the nation's Capitol. Tours last one hour; family members and friends are welcome to accompany the hearing impaired individual on the tour.

The tour office is located in the Crypt Room on the first floor of the Capitol, directly below the Rotunda. The office is open Mondays through Fridays, 9:00 am to 6:00 pm. To schedule an appointment for interpreting services, write to them, or call 1-202-224-4048 (voice) or 1-202-224-4049 (TTY). You may also contact your Senator's office to request the services.

Update on Center for the Deaf

*** Joseph and LaVern Burnett have made a generous contribution to the Utah Community Center for the Deaf in memory of their good friends, Paul & Ila Lambert. Dr. Robert Sanderson, director of the Center, said such donations are tax deductible and are an important part of maintaining the center and its programs when state money dries up because of budget limitations.

*** Thanks to Kenneth Burdett, who donated to the Center for the Deaf the profits from the sale of some of his own old, historical pictures. Such generosity is really appreciated; every little bit helps because the UCCD has been running low on funds lately as we try to keep up with the constant maintenance costs.

*** Progress in meeting the many needs of the building is slow but sure. Not everything can be done at once, but as money becomes available, renovations are to be made.

Two window room air conditioners were donated to the Center by the Ogden District Rehabilitation office -- which were no longer needed because of a move from the old Weber High School to the Five Points area. One has been installed (courtesy of Rehab) in the photo lab to relieve the extreme heat generated by processing equipment and hot water photo baths in the unventilated rooms. A large ceiling fan has also been installed to exhaust the steamy air.

The State has installed a fire alarm system with strobe lights, so now we can see the alarm when it goes off!

Lloyd Perkins, building maintenance boss, with great help from Norman Williams, our TTY specialist, has been busy with the many small projects that the director has asked them to do. Cabinet work, plumbing, electric wiring, painting, and the "nuts and bolts" of everyday maintenance keep them busy. Willis Morton, our hard working maintenance man, keeps our yards clean, the lawns mowed, shrubs trimmed, and carpets vacuumed.

In the plans for the future, as money becomes available, are several major needs. They are an elevator (\$20-\$25,000) so that the upper floor is accessible to the handicapped and the senior citizens who cannot easily mount the stairs; exterior paint and sealer for the entire building (\$10-\$15,000); air conditioning to replace those that have broken down; a new boiler or forced air furnace (\$40,000). Less expensive needs are a new window in the conference room; blocking gym windows with cement blocks to prevent water leaks and breakage; new toilets; new kitchen stove; new wash basins and tile in the women's rest room; new exterior doors; and numerous other small items.

Also needed is a more powerful 16 mm movie projector which can deliver a sharper picture from the projection booth in the gym to the screen on the stage. The present screen needs to be repaired, too, with a special beaded glass screen.

The director is actively seeking a CompSet or CompEdit typesetting machine which will be used in training deaf people. Most printing businesses now use this machine instead of the old hot metal or Photons, so deaf people who know how to use the newer machines have a better chance of getting employment. This machine can also be used by organizations for the deaf to print their flyers, announcements, bulletins and the like. The cost for a rebuilt machine is about \$5-\$7,000.

*** Reminder: Deaf couples may use the Chapel for weddings; the gym and kitchen can be used for receptions, too. Dr. Sanderson has copies of the Center policy on hand for those who wish to have such events. Arranging ahead of time is a MUST to avoid conflicts in scheduling, and to make sure a responsible person is in charge.

*** Reminder: Doll making classes begin the week of September 17-21 -- the evening class is full, but there is room in the day class. Contact Beth Ann Campbell about this, at 533-5997 SLC:V/T. Also, Dr. Jay Campbell's financial class will be on 22nd and 29th of September, 10:00 am both days, at the Center.

Medical Center Offers Services for Deaf Patients

West Jordan Medical Center is able to serve deaf patients. Dr. Philip Zazove, who is hard of hearing, has a knowledge of sign language, as does his receptionist. Also, his office has a TDD which enables deaf patients to call and make appointments, obtain information and the like. The receptionist is also able to call deaf patients by TDD. Dr. Zazove is in family practice, and takes obstetric cases as well.

A letter has been sent to many deaf citizens along the Wasatch Front. Dr. Zazove can take new patients, and his office is open Mondays through Fridays, and Saturday mornings until noon.

This route has a night and Sunday service, but no holiday service.

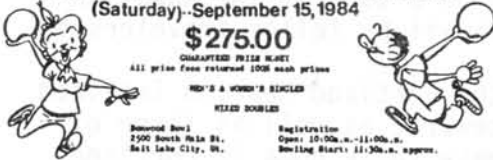

Update on Closed Captioning

*** In a first for the lodging industry, Hyatt Hotels Corporation will offer hearing impaired travelers access to closed captioned television viewing at all 75 Hyatt hotels in the United States by the end of 1984.

In cooperation with Spectradyne, Inc., Hyatt will install a device that will split the ABC station in all locales and enable hearing impaired guests to receive the closed captioned programs on a specially designated channel.

The complimentary service is currently available at Hyatt Regency Baltimore, Hyatt Regency Crystal City (near Washington National Airport) and Hyatt Regency Washington (on Capitol Hill). Closed captioning will be installed at 25 Hyatt hotels by September 1, 53 hotels by December 1 and the remaining hotels by the end of 1984.

*** Home Box Office (HBO) is offering "Under Fire" with closed captioning during the month of September. Nick Nolte and Joanna Cassidy star as foreign correspondents who are swept into the adventure, intrigue and politics of war-torn Nicaragua.

*** One of CBS offerings this fall with closed captioning will be "Dallas," which is starting Friday, September 24 with its seventh season. This popular "evening soap" details the dramatic life of the Ewing family, wealthy Texas oil magnates.

*** Public Broadcasting Service will broadcast old time favorites "Masterpiece Theatre," "Mystery!," "American Playhouse," and "Great Performances" with closed captions this fall.

*** A new 26 unit math and science TV series, "The Voyage of Mimi," will be aired on PBS beginning September 10. It details the adventures of a floating whale research laboratory.

A new twist is that it will be closed captioned in English and in Spanish. To get the English captions, select C1 on the decoder; for Spanish, C2.

*** The Fall season of "America Works," which will be broadcast by PBS, will offer six episodes, among them: a steelworker trying to improve the quality of his product and his worklife in Cleveland; a librarian in Maryland who is concerned about female state employees who are locked into low paying job categories; citizens and workers fighting to equalize the tax burden.

*** Money is the subject of a new 13 part series starting this fall on PBS. "On the Money" is a fast paced, entertaining series of half hour programs which explores all aspects of personal and family money management.

News of Note

A public service workshop was given by Pat Johanson which offered basic sign language instruction to local law enforcement personnel. American Fork police officers were the latest to receive the benefits of this program.

Pat has also developed programs for physicians and nurses, as well as firemen, ambulance personnel, court officials and lawyers, adapting the basic sign language to their particular needs.

As a result of the increase in quota fee, the UAD membership fees will be increased, too. UAD bylaws presently sets fees at \$10.00 biennially for single active members, \$17.00 for husband/wife active members, and \$2.00 for associate members. The new change now makes it \$15.00 biennially for single active members, \$25.00 for husband/wife active members, and \$8.00 for associate members. This new change was voted on and passed at the 1983 UAD convention last fall.

An item of interest is that the National Association for the Deaf, through letters and selected coalitions, has joined in the effort to obtain double income tax exemption for handicapped persons, including deaf people.

A motion to study the feasibility and make a recommendation to establish a second NAD branch office in the West was referred to the council serving state associations and the NAD finance committee. See you next month -- the editor is cutting me off...
