## UAD Membership Dues Go Up

As UAD members who attended the 1983 UAD convention are aware, the membership passed a motion to raise membership dues, effective with the 1985 convention, if the NAD proposal to raise the quota fee from \$2.00 to \$4.00 was ratified by a majority of state associations.

At the 1984 NAD convention in Baltimore, MD, it was confirmed that the proposal had been ratified. The NAD quota fee is now \$4.00.

For the 1985-1987 membership dues, active members will pay \$25.00 per couple and \$15.00 per single. Associate members -- those living out of state or attending high school -- pay \$8.00.

## Interpreter Trainee Assigned to UCCD

The Utah Community Center for the Center has the services of Mollie Fruits, an interpreter trainee from the West Oregon College in Monmouth, OR. She has completed nine months of classwork and is doing three months of field work as an intern at the UCCD.

In her internship, she observes interpreting situations and does some interpreting. She chose to do her internship at UCCD as it offers a wide variety of interpreting situations and an opportunity to improve her signing skills.

### On Target Classes Seek Funding

### Elderhostel for Deaf Seniors Planned for Fall

The first Midwest Elderhostel for deaf seniors will be held at Wilder Forest, Stillwater, MN from October 6 to 11. Elderhostel is a one week live-in college program for people 60 years and older.

Three special courses about the natural environment will be given. Deaf seniors will study the science of the outdoors through walks, slides and demonstrations. An art course and a writing course based on personal experiences of the outdoors will be offered. Sign language interpreters will be available throughout the week. The total cost of \$195 covers room, board, tuition and all additional activities. Partial scholarships are available on request.

Wilder Forest is a year around camp and conference center offering handicapped accessible facilities with semi private and dormitory style rooms in a setting ideal for creativity, contemplation, study and enjoyment. Transportation to Wilder Forest will be available.

So even if it means waiting for your lawyer or interpreter, or both, to show up, it is time well worth taking.
