### Join UAD Now -- NAD Convention Coming Up

A membership drive is on to encourage people to join the Utah Association for the Deaf. The cost is \$25.00 per couple and \$15.00 per single person for active membership, covering a period of two years from June 14, 1985 to the next convention (but not including) the next convention, June 1987. Associate membership, which is limited to out of state people and to high school students, is available at \$8.00 and runs for the same length of time.

Those who plan to attend any part of the NAD convention, including the Miss Deaf America Pageant, will find that they are required to be a member of a state association or the NAD. If they are not members of either a state association or the NAD at the time of registration, a membership fee will be required. This would create a financial crush for some, so the wise ones can ease the crush by joining the UAD now.

### Defense Depot Ogden Installs 6 TDDs

To enable deaf and hearing impaired workers to call in and out of Defense Depot Ogden, the federal facility has purchased 6 Miniprint TDDs. DDO held a training session recently for both deaf workers and their supervisors to familiarize them with these TDDs. The TDDs will be especially helpful in times when the deaf workers must be contacted or when they need to call in sick. No phone numbers are published here as the TDDs are limited to private use.

## Summary of UAD Board Minutes

**August 3, 1985 at the Utah Community Center for the Deaf:** Present: R. Cochran, R. DeSpain, D. Platt, R. Sanderson, N. Sausedo, R. Welsh, R. Simonsen. Excused: L. Perkins, J. Saunders, S. O'Neal, K. Walker.

Glen (Corky) Sparr was sworn in as trustee of the UAD Board of Trustees. He is third trustee.

The minutes of the UAD general membership meeting of April 20 was accepted with one correction. The minutes of the June 29 board meeting was accepted as read.

V. Platt, UAD business manager, passed out her report, which was accepted by the board as read.

It was moved and passed to have UAD thank those people who volunteered their time to making and painting the shelves for the UAD business office.

The board agreed to have an open house for the UAD office on Thursday, September 26.

With regard to the Model 28 TTY report given by V. Platt, it was accepted as read. The board agreed to reduce the price of Model 28 TTY to \$120 -- the price to include gear.

D. Platt took the responsibility to see that a 6' x 2' banner with the UAD name and logo be purchased.

The final report for the 1985 UAD convention was given out by R. Cochran, chairman of the convention. The revenues came to \$844.00, with expenses \$687.50, leaving a profit of \$156.50.

A financial report (as of July 15, 1985) for the Miss Deaf Utah committee was given out. It was accepted with the provision that a final report be given including rental costs. The board also asked that Shirley Snow, state director for the pageant, be asked to come to the next board meeting to give her report.

The president, R. Cochran, announced that he has appointed Corky Sparr to be the UAD representative at the UCCD Advisory Council.

The secretary, R. DeSpain, gave out copies of several policies, listing of committees and guidelines of some committees. The board moved to give him a vote of thanks for the work of putting together papers for board members. It was suggested that changes be made on the committee listing and have it brought back to the next meeting.

After some discussion on Amateur Night, it was decided that the president, R. Cochran, would appoint a committee to check on it and report on it at the October meeting.

It was announced that David Samuelsen had been appointed as chairman of the UAD legislative workshop, to be held November 9.

With regard to the UO calendar (now known as UCCD Calendar) it was moved to have the editor insert it in the next UAD Bulletin. (Editor's note: this was not followed as the September UCCD Newsletter included it as part of its news).

The Fall Event on October 19 is to be cancelled; our only fall event will be the legislative workshop on November 9.

The resignation of one board member could not be acted on since the chairman of the board, S. O'Neal, was absent and has the letter of resignation. Action will take place at the next board meeting.

The question of why the UAD sign (indicating the location of UAD Office) had not yet been put up was brought up. The board indicated that the secretary is to write to Beth Ann Campbell and ask for the reason for the delay.

## Update on Closed Captioning (Programs listed below are offered with closed captioning. For exact date and time, check your local listing).

\*\* The entire 1985 - 1986 prime time programming schedule on ABC will be closed captioned for the hearing impaired. This offers 22 hours per week. In addition to prime time, other programming such as national news will be continue to be offered, giving 20 more hours of closed captioning. This is a contrast to the five hours of closed captioned programming offered by ABC in March of 1985.

\*\* For the fifth season, the ABC "Afterschool Specials" will be closed captioned for the hearing impaired. Fourteen programs of the children's series will be aired on Wednesdays from September to April. Among its presentations will be "One Too Many," a highly acclaimed drama about drinking and driving, which was shown May 1985. This drama will be rebroadcast during this season. "Afterschool Specials" has earned 42 Emmy Awards since its inception in October, 1972.

\*\* The highly acclaimed family show, "The Cosby Show" is now closed captioned. It airs on Thursday evenings on NBC.

\*\* Public Broadcasting Systems is continuing its policy of offering "Masterpiece Theatre," "Mystery!" and "Nova" with closed captioning. New offerings include "Owl/TV," "War: A commentary by Gwynne Dyer," "Great Performances," "This Old House" as well as "An American Masters Special."

\*\* CBS has "Newhart" in dual mode captioning, offering hearing impaired viewers a sampling of Bob Newhart's humor in his role as a Vermont innkeeper whose offbeat employees, guests and neighbors involve him in sticky but hilarious situations. "Newhart" airs Mondays. Another new CBS offering, "Charlie & Company," is also closed captioned. Flip Wilson is the father trying to run a Chicago family of the '80's on the traditional values he remembers. This one airs Wednesdays.

\*\* CBS is continuing "Dallas" and "Knots Landing" for another season with closed captioning, the former on Fridays and the latter on Thursdays. Also aired is "An American Portrait," a series of one minute specials focusing on Americans who have contributed to our lives and our country in a special way. It is aired on weeknights.

\*\* Because we do not receive news releases about TV specials, movies and new programs in time for inclusion in the Bulletin, TV viewers are strongly encouraged to tune in to PLUS -- simply set your decoder to Channel 4, and set the lever to TEXT and C1. This will give an updated listing for the week of all programs and specials offered with closed captioning.

## Sports News

George Wilding, vice president of American Athletic Association of the Deaf, and Dennis Platt, president of Northwest Athletic Association of the Deaf, were in St. Louis, MO recently for the AAAD softball tournament. The NWAAD champions, DCARA (men's) and Peninsula (women's) each came fifth in their respective tournament. Dennis acted as head statistician.

The Wasatch Golf Association of the Deaf ended its 1985 golf season with an election. The officers for 1986 are: Robert DeSpain, president; Jerry Deu, vice president; Wayne Stoltz, secretary/treasurer; Doyle Page, head scorer; George Wilding, trustee. The 1986 golf season will feature two league tournaments, 18 holes in May and the same in September.

The golf association plans on a tentative clinic in the early spring on etiquette of golfing, before the golfing season starts. 9 and 18 hole rounds of golf are planned for once or twice a month, and be limited in location to an area between Kaysville and Ogden/Roy. Although the golf sessions are scheduled for Northern Utah only, membership is open to anyone who wishes to play.

## National News

A House of Representatives Bill, H.R. 2895, was introduced in Congress on June 25, 1985 to amend the IRS Code of 1954 to allow the deduction of an additional exemption for a taxpayer or spouse who is deaf. If in support of this additional exemption please contact your congressman.

In Michigan, 300 people gathered at the State Capitol to ask the state legislature to ensure that sign language be taught in public schools and that legislation make it illegal to deny the deaf child right to learn and use sign language.

In Spain, approximately 16,000 deaf persons protested against the integration of deaf children into hearing schools.

The states of Arizona, Illinois, California, Nevada, Florida, Connecticut and Rhode Island provide free TDDs to their deaf citizens.

In Hawaii deaf people can rent a TDD for \$6.00 per month.

In Minnesota, a conflict has developed among deaf groups and individuals as to who is to offer TDDs for sale to the deaf community. Minnesota public utilities has told the phone companies that they must again begin leasing TDDs to deaf people. This decision may hurt the business of a number of deaf people and organizations who are distributors of TDDs.

The Virginia legislature passed a bill requiring the installation of visual smoke detectors in residential units upon written request of the tenant.

The United States team at the XV World Games for the Deaf (Deaf Olympics) in Los Angeles last summer won 46 gold medals, 30 silver and 33 bronze. In second place with the most gold medals was West Germany with 8 gold, 20 silver and 13 bronze.

In Washington D.C., a report released by the Heritage Foundation challenged the results of mainstreaming. It said mainstreamed deaf in public school programs yield minimal positive results for handicapped children and generally damaging results for the normal child.

The governor of Minnesota proposed to close the state school for the deaf because it wasn't cost efficient and deaf students could be educated in local schools for less money. This caused an uproar and strong opposition from the deaf and 500 rallied on the state capitol steps in St. Paul to protest. The governor changed his mind and kept the school for the deaf open.

**October 6** -- Irene Young, 73, of St. Anthony, ID, passed away of cancer at a Rexburg hospital. Funeral and burial took place in St. Anthony. She was the mother of Fay Young of Woods Cross.

**October 6** -- Maria Van Kwawegen, 65, of Salt Lake City, died. She was a native of Holland and moved to the States after her marriage. Alexandra Cano, West Jordan, is a daughter.

**October 10** -- John Fullmer, 74, passed away in Salt Lake City. After the funeral service took place in SLC, burial took place in Farmington. One of his children is Darlene Zimmer of Roy.

**October 10** -- Evelyn Haws, 61, died in Salt Lake City. A funeral service was held at Christ Memorial Methodist Church, SLC, with burial in Sandy. Mrs. Haws was the mother of Ruth Ann Perkins, Riverton.
