Summary of Board Minutes

March 1, 1986 at the Utah Community Center for the Deaf.

Present: R. Cochran, R. Walker, R. Sanderson, P. Green, D. Mortensen, G. Sparr, G. Gavros, G. Laramie and R. Welsh. N. Sausedo and D. Platt were excused.

There were 11 visitors.

Roy Cochran presided.

Minutes of the February 1, 1986 meeting were read and approved.

Celia May Baldwin, member of Board of Trustees, verified the treasurer's financial report of the last quarter of 1985. A suggestion was made to have the change of interpreters' salaries effective in April instead of January.

The financial report on MDU Carnival was passed out. The report was tabled till next meeting due to incompleteness. The president will handle it and see Robert DeSpain on this.

Valerie Platt gave her business manager's report, covering fourth quarter sales, the need for an external disk drive for the UAD computer, membership drive and better use of liquid cash in checking and saving accounts.

Valerie Platt was authorized by the board to purchase a hard disk drive for the UAD computer. Words of praise were expressed for Valerie Platt's comprehensive report.

Robert Sanderson's report as United Way Liaison Officer showed that a committee consisting of Robert Sanderson, David Mortensen, Valerie Platt and George Gavros, met with the United Way panel on February 27th for questions and answers on the allocation from the United Way for interpreter's salaries.

Celia May Baldwin pointed out that the March 22nd play was in good shape and progressing well.

David Mortensen reported that a non-profit agency already has its own van. Word was received from the UCCD saying that the UAD van must be moved out from the UCCD parking lot. The board authorized the van be sold. The board ordered the van to be appraised by a local salesman.

No action was taken on the budget worksheet as Nellie Sausedo, treasurer, was absent.

The clarification of victim's rights was explained by David Mortensen. A letter expressing State Attorney's opinion will be sent to David Mortensen and copies of the same to the Board of Directors will be sent.

Payment for Secretary's and Treasurer's work was proposed by George Laramie. Since UAD is a non-profit organization, board members under the law cannot receive salary, wages or benefits but can receive reimbursement for expenses. Peter Green moved the proposal be dropped. Passed.

The proposal to have trainees for recording secretary and business manager as suggested by George Laramie was aired. The proposal was dropped.

Copies of Dennis Platt's letter to Governor N. Bangerter were passed out. This letter acknowledges our support for Roy Cochran's bid for a seat on the Institutional Council.

A full page advertisement was approved by the board, to be inserted in the program book of the NWAAD Softball Tournament which is to be hosted by the GSACD in Ogden, Utah. The business manager is to make a design of the same advertisement.

Regarding NAD Committee recommendation concerning membership, Robert Sanderson explained the policy of the Active and Associate Members as defined by the By-Laws, especially for the NAD convention and also for Miss Deaf America pageant.

Janet Barker presented her proposal to have UAD advertise TDDS and decoders in the Ogden Standard Examiner. The board agreed to insert a 4 inch column advertisement in the Ogden Standard Examiner and the same advertisement in the Salt Lake Tribune.

Robert Welsh expressed his consideration about donating his photographic equipment to the UAD. The board moved to accept the concept of Robert Welsh's offer and look forward to a formal agreement at a later time.

Robert Welsh was given words of appreciation for his generosity with his offer.

NAD Convention Questions & Answers

Are seats for Live Theatre & Miss Deaf America Pageant reserved?

Since both events take place in Capitol Theatre, seats are reserved. After sections are set aside (for example, sections for parents of MDAP participants, state directors/chaperones at the pageant), seats are assigned on a first come, first served (in the order received by the registration chairman). View of the stage is good to excellent, and since there are over 1,900 seats, chances are excellent that you will get a good view. There is a seating plan posted at the UAD Business Office - check with Valerie Platt.

Can I buy my ticket at the door?

For the President's Reception and Awards Luncheon, ticket sales will stop 48 hours (and possibly more) before the event begins. For Live Theatre and Miss Deaf America Pageant finals, ticket sales will continue up to the last minute. For the dance on Saturday evening, ticket sales may stop early in the week if the number of tickets reaches a certain level. In all cases, you are strongly encouraged to buy your ticket(s) before the convention week begins. Avoid long lines at the registration desk!

Summer Elderhostel Programs Again Offered

Gallaudet College is offering two one-week Elderhostel programs to deaf adults who are 60 years of age or older and their companions or spouses of any age.

"Deaf History and the Nation's Capital" will be held June 15-21 and combines a series of classes taught by experts on deaf history with off-campus tours in Washington, DC. Deaf instructors will discuss ways to appreciate museums, art and architecture. There will also be seminars to discuss the folklore of deaf people, and a political process workshop held in the Capitol.

"Comprehensive Retirement Planning" will be held June 22-28 and is designed to assist participants in evaluating their current and future retirement plans. Participants will analyze life styles, financial situations, health plans, family and social networks, living arrangements and use of spare time during retirement years. Each person may design a personal plan with the assistance of instructors.

The cost for each Elderhostel program, including registration, tuition, room and board for six days (from Sunday dinner to Saturday breakfast), tours, admissions and materials is \$205.00 per person. 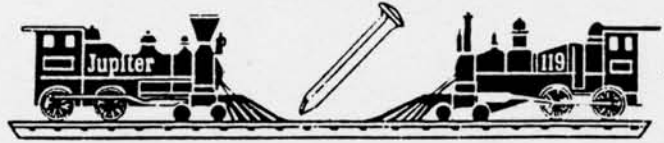
