Summary of UAD Board of Directors' Meeting

June 7, 1986 at the Utah Community Center for the Deaf.
Present: D. Platt, G. Gavros, G. Laramie, N. Sausedo, R. Welsh, P. Green, R. Sanderson, G. Sparr, R. Cochran, R. Walker, D. Mortensen. Visitors numbered twelve.

Minutes of May 3 meeting was approved as read.

Copies of the CPA report were passed out to all board members. The treasurer, Nellie Sausedo, gave a few remarks on some items in the report.

Return of UAD equipment by the former secretary, Robert DeSpain, has not yet met with success. (Shortly before the NAD convention, the equipment was returned. Editor's note)

It was announced that the United Way panel would meet on June 21st to reconsider funding the UAD interpreter project.

Dave Mortensen, interpreter director, presented his report. The board decided to support the concept of holding back the paycheck if an interpreter does not submit his/her monthly report on time. This ruling is to be placed in the interpreter's policy. The board also moved that compensatory time must be used up within the next pay period from the time it was worked.

A committee is directed by the board of directors to work with the interpreter director to revise the interpreter policy and go through the interpreter project, and present their recommendations to the board of directors for final decisions. (Names of committee members are withheld pending acceptance -- editor's note)

A second committee is directed by the board of directors to review the interpreter policy and make recommendations. (Names of committee members are also withheld pending acceptance -- editor's note)

The newspaper advertisement is presently being completed.

The NAD convention co-chairman, Robert Sanderson, reported that 601 had preregistered and that 28 workshops had been set up. A chess tournament will take place during the convention week.

The board moved to become involved in the NAD convention by sponsoring the second place trophy for the chess tournament and to host the first coffee break on Tuesday morning of the convention week.

After Shirley Snow, state director of Miss Deaf Utah Pageant, gave her report, the board approved a motion to have the MDU Fund pay \$150, after other organizations have made their donations, toward the airfare ticket from Maryland for Kayleen Pugh. The MDU committee will have a fundraiser in September. The board moved to express its appreciation to Shirley Snow for a well done job.

Lagoon Day, although it will be held on the last Saturday of the NAD convention week, will go ahead as scheduled. A chairman has not been named.

Two letters, one from the University of Utah for fieldwork, and the other from Junior League offering volunteer service, will be answered by Robert Sanderson.

R. Cochran announced that although he sent a letter asking to be selected to the screening committee to consider a new superintendent of the Utah School for the Deaf and the Blind, he has received no reply.

Copies of the SB (Senate Bill) 1874 known as "Education of the Deaf Act" were passed out to board members.

The board chose Robert Welsh as its nomination for the NAD Robert M. Greenmun Award. This award will be presented at the NAD awards luncheon during the convention.

Regarding the NAD raffle tickets, R. Cochran mentioned that cash from sales of NAD raffle tickets must be turned in to Nellie Sausedo by July 1. The drawing will take place at the NAD dance during the convention.

A request for eight folding tables for use at the chess tournament was given to board members.

Glen Sparr's resignation as member of the UAD board of directors and board of trustees, as well as chairman of Lagoon Day, was accepted by the board, with thanks for his service. Glen has accepted a job in Denver, Colorado.

Marsha Thurston was elected as board member to replace Glen Sparr.

The board decided to elect a new trustee in the next board meeting, and that the next board meeting be held in August.

A motion to pay 21 cents per mile reimbursement to interpreters for mileage was tabled for further study.

New Monroe Boulevard Extension Goes Thru USD Campus

Work has been steadily moving along since summer on the extension of Monroe Boulevard from 12th Street to 20th Street. The work was still going on when USD opened its doors for the 1986-1987 academic year; USD administrators asked for, and got a fence to protect deaf and multihandicapped youngsters.

By agreement between the Utah State Board of Education and the Utah Department of Transportation, this extension goes through the northwest corner of the Utah School for the Deaf campus, where the football field is located. The football field will be relocated at UDOT expense to another part of the campus.

HEAT Assistance Offered for 1986-1987 Winter

Low income individuals and families are eligible to apply for heating energy assistance. Eligibility is determined by income; for example, an household of one person with a net monthly income of \$558 or less would qualify. The cut off level for an household of four would be \$1,145 a month.

When applying at the local Social Service Office, bring identification, Social Security cards, proof of income, past utility bills, and past medical bills.

Three Scholarships Awarded to Deaf College Students

The Utah Scholarship Foundation for the Deaf has awarded three \$200 scholarship grants to deaf college students for the academic year 1986-1987.

The winners are Nanette Hix, a junior at Gallaudet College who is majoring in deaf education and minoring in developmental drama; Lyle Monsen, a freshman at Gallaudet College who recently graduated from Skyline High School in SLC, and Julene Yazzie Pikyavit, a 1969 USD graduate, who is attending Southern Utah State College in Cedar City, majoring in computer science.

Scholarships are granted to deaf individuals who residency is in Utah and who are attending, or about to attend, a school or college beyond the high school level. Donations can be made to the foundation; they are tax deductible. Contact Barbara Bass for more information.

USD Wins Battle With UTA for Bus Service

The Utah Transit Authority, after four months, agreed to have direct bus service for USD restored, effective September 8th. Utah School for the Deaf administrators had charged UTA with discrimination after turning down a request for direct bus service on 20th Street when UTA provided direct service to the Ogden/Weber Area Vocational Center campus but did not do the same for USD.

Student safety was the main concern and the reason for the request for direct bus service.

Route 18 travelled up 23rd street, and USD authorities requested that the Route 18 be reassigned to the 20th/21st Street run. The direct bus service on 20th/21st Streets will remain until next spring when the Monroe Boulevard extension is completed and bus routes are reshuffled to provide service along the new street.

The Northwest Athletic Association of the Deaf softball tournament, held in Ogden in August, concluded with both Fremont teams as winners of the men's and women's divisions. The men's team will go on to Atlanta, Georgia for the American Athletic Association of the Deaf softball tourney, to be held in September.

Local teams which participated in the regional tourney were the GSACD men's, which ranked 9th; GSACD women's, which went into the championship game, gave Fremont women's team a run for their money and came out 2nd; UACD men's came in 10th and women's 3rd.

Dennis Platt, NWAAD president, presided at the Thursday evening meeting at the Ogden Hilton. Craig Opheikens, a former Ogdenite, was present for the weekend as he is NWAAD recording secretary.

The next NWAAD event will be the basketball tournament on February 26-28, 1987 at Fremont, California.

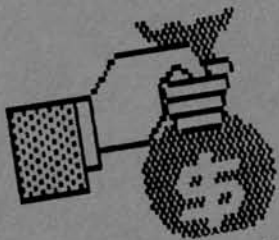

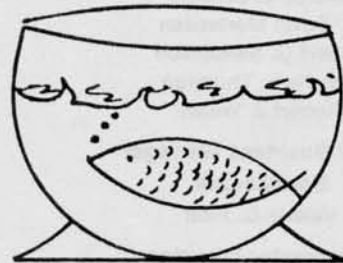
