Gallaudet Hosts Sixth Annual Elderhostel

Elderhostel programs are held all over the nation, but Gallaudet University is the only one to offer Elderhostel programs specifically designed for deaf adults fluent in sign language.

This year's offerings are two: first is **Deaf History and the Nation's Capital**, to be held from May 31 to June 6, and includes lectures and field trips about deaf history, deaf folklore and visits to historic sites and national monuments in Washington, DC.

The second is **Legal Rights: From the Courtroom to Congress**, to be held from June 14 to June 20. It offers classes about laws and legislation important to deaf people, and include visits to the White House, the US Capitol and Senate, and other famous sites in Washington, DC.

During Elderhostel, participants are housed in air conditioned dormitories within short walking distance of the dining facilities, campus snack bar and bookstore. The programs are hosted by warm and friendly Elderhostel staff who use sign language. Also, summer lectures, theatre and other special activities taking place on Gallaudet's historic 90 acre campus will be offered.

Summary of Board Minutes

February 3, 1987 at the Utah Community Center for the Deaf. Present: R. Cochran, R. Welsh, R. Sanderson, P. Green, R. Walker, D. Mortensen, G. Laramie, G. Gavros, N. Sausedo, M. Thurston. R. Welsh was excused. Nine visitors were present.

Minutes of January 3, 1987 meeting were read and approved.

Copies of the treasurer's fourth quarter 1986 financial report, as yet unaudited, were passed out to board members. The report was filed.

Robert Sanderson presented the final 1986 NAD Convention financial report -- the net gain for the UAD was \$3,211.14. The UAD board of directors along with UAD members gave their heartfelt thanks to chairpersons Robert Sanderson and Mary Sanderson for their hard work in bringing success to the NAD convention held in Utah.

Valerie Platt reported on the search for a new CPA. The report was accepted, and the board directed that a committee be named by the chairman of the board to study and evaluate the CPA bids. Robert Sanderson was selected as chairman of this committee, with two others to be named to the committee later.

Dennis Platt reported that eleven candidates have accepted to be on the UAD advisory board. One of the eleven has since then died. The board accepted the remaining ten to be on our UAD advisory board. The board also directed that the names of these people be printed on the left margin of the UAD letterhead. Two and four year terms for the UAD advisory board members will be set up.

Roy Cochran presented a letter of thanks from Beth Ann Campbell, director of UCCD, for the donation of Model 28 TTYs from UAD. The board asked that Norman Williams and Jerry Westberg make an appraisal of the value of TTYs donated by UAD.

The folding wooden sign, with the UAD logo and name, is to be disposed of on the direction of the board.

Roy Cochran gave a brief report on his involvement with the USD Council meeting of February 3rd.

Copies of the interpreter policy in its final form were passed out by Dennis Platt to board members. The holiday known as Human Rights Day is to be added to the list of holidays in the policy.

The board agreed to drop the March 28 event.

The board was asked to bring their ideas and thoughts on the Junior NAD summer camp to the next meeting.

Brief reports were given by Robert Sanderson and Dave Mortensen on the United Way and the Title XX meetings. Also, the deaf access bill, SB101, and other bills on education for deaf children, were discussed by Dave Mortensen.

Dave Mortensen updated the board on the latest developments in the Interpreter Program. Doris Christensen has been named temporary UAD interpreter.

The board approved the purchase of a manual on the TDD distribution program and message relay service.

A brief report on the 1987 UAD convention was given by Dave Mortensen for Ron Nelson, chairman.

Flyers on the St. Patrick's Day Vaudeville and Dinner were passed out. Robert DeSpain gave a report on the MDU plans.

We Did It! We Did It! Hurray!

The telephone equal access bill, known as SB 101, passed on the last day of legislature, on February 25, in an exciting 11th hour vote. Sen. Darrell Renstrom and Rep. Ron Stephens spearheaded the push to pass the bill in the Senate and the House, respectively. Tim Funk provided expertise to the deaf access committee members.

A copy of this bill was not available at the time of writing, but basically it provides for TDDs to qualified deaf persons, and for a message relay service. The Public Services Commission (PSC) will need to provide guidelines so that Mountain Bell can implement the surcharge of a few cents a month on every phone line, and start the ball rolling.

SB101 becomes law on April 26 if Governor Bangerter does not veto it. It is expected that he will sign the bill sometime soon.

The celebration held on March 13 at the Utah Community Center for the Deaf attracted a good number of deaf people as well as a few luminaries, such as Sen. Darrell Renstrom, Ted Stewart of PSC, Craig Edwards of International Association of Parents of the Deaf chapter in SLC, to name those who spoke. A potluck dinner was served afterwards.

Interpreters' Corner

Coming up in May is a workshop on legal interpreting, on the 8th and 9th at the Utah Community Center for the Deaf. Those attending must be a member of the Utah Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf. Membership dues are \$10.00 per year. If not a member, then a \$5.00 attendance fee will be charged. This will be the policy at all URID sponsored workshops from now on.

Interpreter evaluations took place in March, and a list of those who certified as interpreters will be printed in a future issue of the UAD Bulletin.

Utah Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf was well represented at the Deaf Access Day at the Utah State Capitol in January. Interpreters were on hand to interpret the legislative sessions in the House and in the Senate, both on that day and on other days when the SB101 came up for discussion and vote.

Weber County Library, which has had a TDD for the last few years, has changed all library phone numbers in a cost-saving move. The number to call on their TDD is 627-6922.

Update on Closed Captioning

(For dates and times of programs listed below, check your local listings. Also, for updates on closed captioned programs, check your TV, -- turn to ABC, and be sure the decoder is turned to C2 and TEXT)

***The National Captioning Institute would really like to be able to keep us fully informed and alert us to upcoming programs which are to be closed captioned. The reality is that most of the time, firm information becomes available only a short time before the program is to be aired. Varying deadlines for publications in the deaf community and similar problems make it frustrating to NCI staff in its effort to share news with us through news releases. Later, when there is a nationwide computer network which the average deaf person can afford to subscribe to, it is its hope to share news of new developments and programs additions/changes with us quickly.

Meanwhile, NCI urges you to watch PLUS (Program Listing Update Service) regularly. This service is accessible with your controls set to TEXT, C2 at any time during the day or evening when there is an ABC network program on the air. The contents of PLUS are updated each day by NCI, using last minute information received from the networks. Most people find it more reliable and comprehensive than their daily newspaper or TV publications.

***In case some readers missed the previously announced good news, it won't hurt to repeat that two of the most popular game shows, **Wheel of Fortune** and **Jeopardy** are to be closed captioned, starting Wednesday, April 1. Readers who may want to express thanks may write brief notes to:
