## UTAH RELAY SERVICE UPDATE

May 6, 1988

Starting May 13, 1988 there will be some changes in Utah Relay Service. These changes have been made to serve more of you who have a hard time getting through to the Relay. Most of the decisions were made in a meeting of the Board of Directors of the Utah Association for the Deaf on May 3. As you know, the Utah Association for the Deaf has responsibility for the contract with the Public Service Commission for the operation of the Utah Relay Service. The decisions made in the meeting are as follows:

1. There will be only one (1) call per person after May 13. After you hang up from one call, you can dial Utah Relay again to make another call. You can do this as many times as you want. We do not have enough money from the \$.03 charge on all telephone lines to hire more operators. Because we have been making three (3) calls for some people, other people have had to wait for a long time, or hang up and try to call again later. We feel it is more fair to all of you to allow only one call so we can serve more callers. If we are not busy at the time you make your call, and you hang up and call us again, you might be able to get through to URS and we can make another call for you. We hope you will understand this new rule and will cooperate with us so we can serve more of you and be fair to **everyone** who wants to use the Relay.

2. After May 13, we will allow only fifteen (15) minutes for you to have a conversation with a friend or member of your family. Again, we do not have enough money to hire more operators, and we have many Relay callers who have a casual and friendly conversation with someone for 30 minutes or more. This has stopped other callers from getting through to the Relay and sometimes they have urgent calls to make. If you call and have a problem to solve regarding your family or home management, you can still have up to 30 minutes for that kind of call.

### Gallaudet Has New Publication

A new 20 page publication, "Communicating with Deaf People" is now available for a limited time only for just \$1.00 (postage and handling) for single copies from the National Information Center on Deafness, Gallaudet University, R-87-7, 800 Florida Ave., NE, Washington, DC 20002.

The new publication is written for the general audience and serves as a comprehensive introduction to the various modes of communication used by deaf people, within their families, in school classrooms and in the workplace. The publication includes illustrations of the manual alphabet, gestures, facial expression, speech-reading, developments of modern technology that can break the barriers between deaf and hearing people, samples of different sign languages from different countries, and examples of the way in which an interpreter may be used in a public setting.

We ask that you give us your full cooperation and support. As soon as we are able to get more money to operate the Relay and also begin the TDD distribution program, we will improve our service to you. We feel as bad as you do that we have to make these new rules.

### Commission on Education of the Deaf Submits Report "Toward Equality: Education of the Deaf"

On February 4, the Commission on Education of the Deaf formally submitted its report to the President and Congress. The report contains numerous findings and recommendations regarding the status of education nationwide for individuals who are deaf, ranging from early identification to adult and continuing education. The Commission wishes to acknowledge and convey its sincere appreciation to the many individuals and organizations who contributed to the report. This information was relayed in a letter from Patricia Johanson, Staff Director for the Commission. The Commission will close its office May 4.

## Commentary Made at Hearing

*Dr. Robert G. Sanderson made the following commentary at the open meeting on March 31. For those of you who missed the meeting, here it is:*

For many years deaf people of Utah have desired and worked for "parity" with services that blind individuals have received for many years past. This new "Division for the Hearing Impaired/Deaf" is a step in the right direction, and I applaud the success of those responsible for securing it in adverse times. However I must express my deep concern that no deaf people were involved during the negotiations, nor was input invited. This is a direct violation of the principles of rehabilitation, that disabled persons should be involved in determining their needs.

Now that the division is approaching reality, I would strongly recommend that:

1. A trained, experienced deaf professional person be employed to head the division.

Rationale: A deaf person with deep understanding of deafness, the needs of deaf people, and their culture, will bring about a renewal of the credibility of the rehabilitation process for deaf people. It appears that faith in the process and personnel has broken down in recent months.

2. I believe that the division should have responsibility for statewide rehabilitation of deaf and hard of hearing persons, and that the director of the division should have straight line responsibility for the rehabilitation counselors for the deaf (RCDs). That is, direct casework supervision responsibility, not just consultant status. This will build strength and overcome present morale problems.

3. I also believe that the division should be headquartered in the Utah Community Center for the Deaf, and have responsibility for supervision of the director of the Center, and for its programs.

Two important rules passed in Boston were a player residency rule previously passed in Las Vegas, temporarily suspended last summer then reinstated in Boston, restricting players to play for member clubs within their regions only and establishing drug testing for players as well as a drug and alcohol program following the same format as USOC (United States Olympic Committee).

### Television And Our Right Of Access

Now that the telephone is being conquered through low cost TDDs and message relay centers, will television be our next technological frontier?

For better or worse, television has become a powerful force to shape and fashion our lives. Television now is a commodity upon which we rely not only for entertainment but for news, education, emergency warnings and even economic advantage.

Television accessibility and its accompanying advantages are the right of every American.

According to the National Institute of Health Statistics, there are 22 million Americans with a significant hearing loss and this number will grow to 32 million by the year 2025.

It is reasonable to assume that most, if not all, of these 22 million hearing impaired persons derive some degree of benefit from television. It is time we derived full benefit.

Hearing impaired Americans pay the full price for their television receivers which come equipped with sound systems. For approximately ten percent of this number, the sound mechanism is completely worthless and of varying degrees of benefit to the remainder. We pay the price but do not reap the benefit.

Hearing impaired Americans pay the same prices for products advertised on television which support and make programming possible. Advertising cost is built into product prices everyone pays. We pay the price but do not reap the benefit.

Hearing impaired Americans pay their taxes to all levels of federal, state and local governments which provide the protective and assistive services necessary to the orderly operation of the broadcast industry. We pay the price but do not reap the benefit.

Since the introduction of TeleCaption decoders in 1980, around 150,000 decoders have been sold nationwide. At present, approximately 180 hours per week of captioned programming is available if the viewer has all the right channels at the right times.

This is pathetic since over 12 million television sets are sold annually.

If only ten percent of the hearing impaired population made use of decoders, there would be over two million in use at present.

The Catch 22 we face is consumer reluctance to pay the price(\$200.00) for a decoder when there is a comparatively limited program selection. Producers, in turn, have difficulty in justifying the expense of captioning for a small audience.

Two additional factors complicate the matter of captioning: 1) the movement toward digital technology by manufacturers and 2) the growth of Teletext.

One manufacturer of television receivers has a line of digital models with built-in Teletext decoders. In only second year of production, this manufacturer claims to have put into consumer hands a number of decoder-equipped digital sets approximating the number of Line 21 Decoders sold from inception of Line 21 captioning.

There has never been and will never be a better time to make the needs of deaf persons known to the television equipment makers and the networks. Right now, when designs for new equipment are being developed, we should insist that the decoding capability be built in rather than added on at a later date.

We should take advantage of the tremendous power of the free market and its ability to sell a product. We should have good old American competition be the force that delivers receivers in numbers that will assure universal captioning.

And we must do it now.

We must be heard by the corporate leadership of the television equipment manufacturers. We must be heard by the networks, the Federal Communications Commission, our elected officials and by our President.

The opportunity is here. Let us grab it.

**Texas** - Deaf Texans can call the highway department to find out about road conditions in Texas. The Highway Department's Information Services Section has a new TDD for their hearing impaired population to find out about snow, ice or flooding conditions on roads throughout the state.

The new TDD number is 512-463-6635 and office hours are 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, Monday thru Thursday.

**New Mexico** - The New Mexico Association of the Deaf is actively working on the development of a statewide TDD distribution and message relay system with the help of Mountain Bell.

**Oklahoma** - Provides TDDs to hearing impaired residents and has a new message relay center in the Oklahoma City area (405) 525-8628 and the Tulsa area (918) 252-3022.

**Virginia** - The Department of Taxation has a new TDD (804) 367-8329. The Department of Corrections also has a new TDD in their personnel office (804) 367-9134. The number can be used to find out about employment or inquire of inmates.

**Virginia** - There are several bills passed in the General Assembly affecting the hearing impaired community. One increases the number of visual smoke detectors for the deaf in hotels and motels, and strengthens local and statewide enforcement and penalties. Another authorizes the Virginia Department for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing to operate a program of TDD assistance, including distribution and message relay support.
